## Crime stats fall

*A partnership between the City of Canada Bay and Burwood Local Area Command to reduce incidents of community crime has had a positive effect on local crime figures.*

Mayor Angelo Tsirekas visited the new Burwood station recently to discuss the positive impacts of various programs, including education and information leaflets.

“It is very pleasing to learn the combined efforts of Council and the police have worked, with a marked drop in a number of key crime areas,” said Mayor Tsirekas.

Senior Constable John Tikisci, Burwood Police Crime Prevention Officer agreed.

“A combination of community support and proactive policing have been a major factor in the decrease in crime rates,” he said.

“Assaults have dropped 25 per cent, robberies 14 per cent, break and enters into homes 10 per cent and stolen vehicles 20 per cent in the last financial

year, while assaults involving alcohol have plummeted 36 per cent.”

While the statistics show that theft from shops have increased, this is due to a higher level of reporting.

Senior Constable Tikisci said police were encouraging shop owners to report all thefts, which is reflected in the figures.

Police hold Community Safety Precinct Committee meetings quarterly where members of the community, especially representatives of community groups can attend and discuss any issues they may have regarding crime in the community.

The next meeting is Wednesday, 2 November 2011 at 10am at Burwood Police Station in Belmore Street. All are welcome.

## Mayor leads push to change trailer laws

*City of Canada Bay Mayor, Angelo Tsirekas, is leading a push to rid the City of advertising trailers, particularly those along Lyons Road West, Canada Bay.*

Local residents have joined the chorus of objection to the trailers, expressing concern about safety for motorists and cyclists.

Mayor Tsirekas said a motion to gain State Government support to regulate advertising trailers will be going to the upcoming Local Government Association Conference.

"I have received a number of complaints from local residents who have expressed real concerns about the dangers these parked trailers pose and

most people travelling along this section of road would have to agree," Mayor Tsirekas said.

"There are huge problems getting these trailers moved on, particularly on RTA controlled roads, so the best course of action is to lobby the State Government to change the law.

"I will be urging councils to support our push. This is an issue that affects every suburb in Sydney and one that is becoming a blight on the landscape of the City of Canada Bay."

## Anti Bullying Campaign

## Campaign for increased safety at Concord West Public

*Increased safety for students and pedestrians is behind a push by Mayor Angelo Tsirekas and Council, to have pedestrian barriers installed around Concord West Public School.*

Mayor Tsirekas is urging the Roads and Traffic Authority (RTA) to look at the proposal, which covers the area along Concord Road at Hospital Road intersection.

“Initial advice from the RTA is that funds for these projects have already been allocated, however we will continue to lobby for this important road safety issue to be addressed,” Mayor Tsirekas said.

“Concord Road is a major arterial road

in the City of Canada Bay and the intersection is extremely busy.

“Combine this regular traffic with the issues associated with school start and finish times, and it highlights the need to put our children’s and families safety first.”

Mayor Tsirekas said letters have been forwarded to both the RTA and State Member for Drummoyne, John Sidoti, seeking their support for the proposal.

## Sculpture unveiling at Kokoda Track

*Kokoda Day, Thursday, 3 November will be celebrated by unveiling a special bronze statue representing a wounded Australian soldier.*

The City of Canada Bay will host a special Civic Reception for the Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels who will attend the ceremony.

The statue will be installed at the front of the Ralph Honnor Education Centre on the Kokoda Track memorial walkway to commemorate the invaluable assistance of the Papua New Guinea people during the Kokoda campaign of World War 2.

The Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels were pivotal in the rescue of injured diggers during the Papua New Guinea campaign. Mayor Angelo Tsirekas and Council have developed a special relationship with them over the years through its work with the Kokoda Track Foundation. Mayor Tsirekas is also very familiar with the gruelling Kokoda Track having walked it twice.

The statue will mirror another existing sculpture which is located at Concord Hospital.

## Council wins wharf safety campaign

*City of Canada Bay Mayor, Angelo Tsirekas, has hailed new security measures at Cabarita Wharf as a win for the community.*

“Council has continually called for a complete ban on fishing,” Mayor Tsirekas said.

“We have finally found success in our campaign to both ban fishing from the wharf and have security gates installed.”

Ports Minister, Duncan Gay, announced a 24 hour ban on fishing from Cabarita wharf, a commuter wharf on the Parramatta River Ferry service.

“This is a fantastic result for the community and shows the success a targeted and planned campaign can have,” Mayor Tsirekas said.

“Commuter safety on our wharves is paramount and it’s something I have argued for many years.

“These new security measures will make it harder for fishermen to use the wharf as a fishing spot which has resulted in our commuters - whether they are residents or visitors - having to negotiate the waste associated with fishing.

“We have a responsibility as a community to ensure the safety and security of all people who come to our area and our wharves are no different.

“The City of Canada Bay has some of the most beautiful foreshore areas in Sydney and for ferry users to be deterred by rubbish and pollution is unacceptable.

“I will not stop campaigning for reliable and safe public transport links for our residents and visitors and the Minister’s announcement today is recognition of that.”

## Bay Run moving ahead

*Work to finalise the construction of the Bay Run is one step closer with concept plans prepared for community consultation.*

Council is planning to construct the remaining 720 metres of the Bay Run, estimated to cost around \$3.5 million over the next two years.

The project will be jointly funded by Council, the Roads and Traffic Authority and the Department of Planning via the Sharing Sydney Harbour Access

Program (SSHAP). The Bay Run will provide City of Canada Bay residents with one of the premier outdoor walking, jogging and cycling tracks in Sydney.

The plans are expected to be put to public consultation in the next few months, with work on this final section is expected to commence in early in 2012.

## Bayview Park boat ramp upgrade

*Bayview Park boat ramp users will soon enjoy a better launching spot for boats, with an upgrade of the ramp expected to be complete at the end of November.*

Work on the upgrade commenced in mid-September but was suspended through the spring school holiday period.

The \$300,000 upgrade was funded through NSW Maritime's Better Boating Program and will ensure safer and more efficient access to the river.

Mayor Angelo Tsirekas said the funding was welcomed by locals who have been working with Council to lobby for funding.

An articulated ramp pontoon will extend 40 metres into the water and provide for a safer launch and retrieval of recreational boats.

Once the new launch area is complete, access will be much easier and will ease the problems boaters have experienced with winds.

## Residents support Bushcare program

*Once again, the City of Canada Bay threw its weight behind National Tree Day held on Sunday, 1 September.*

Eighty people including Drummoyne Cubs and Yaralla Sea Scouts planted 1,200 trees at Queen Elizabeth Park Concord.

Activities started on Friday, 29 August with schools in the City taking part in Schools Tree Day.

Concord West Primary School planted 300 Sydney Turpentine Ironbark Forest plants with eight IKEA staff at the Kododa Education Centre and along the Kokoda Track at Rhodes Park.

Abbotsford Primary, Russell Lea Infants, Domremy College and Concord High were among participating schools.

Residents then turned out in force for the Growers for Greenspace planting day on Sunday, 11 September at Arthur Walker Reserve, Concord.

Part of Bushcare's Major Day Out, 36 volunteers planted more than 1,000 native plants. Another 600 plants propagated by volunteers will be used in other Bushcare projects throughout the Parramatta River Catchment.

Thirty five City of Canada Bay residents are involved in the catchment project in partnership with Strathfield, Hunters Hill, Ashfield and Bankstown Councils.

## Sustainable Rhodes West

*Rhodes West has all the unique attributes of a sustainable suburb.*

Centrally located in Sydney with spectacular water views, it has a train station, buses, ferries and major shopping centre – including the popular IKEA store - all a comfortable walk away.

The suburb is planned on sustainable transport principles with limited private car parking in the area.

All new tower developments were approved on the condition developers must provide new residents and occupants with a package of information on public transport options and timetables. Plans must also nominate car parking spaces for future car share schemes and it is anticipated that car share operators will commence business once near full occupancy is reached.

Council has also engaged transport specialist, Dr Michelle Zeibots, Institute of Sustainable Futures at Sydney's

University of Technology to help produce a Travel and Access Guide (TAG) which will be available to all residents of the Rhodes Peninsula.

This document will have information on transport times, community facilities, services in the area and walking and cycling routes. There will be a pocket-size version of the Rhodes TAG plus a regularly-updated web version.

Assisted by Dr Zeibots, Council will work with public transport operators to develop strategies to increase public transport coordination, improved services and increased patronage in the area.

Ultimately Council's aim is to encourage the use of public transport, walking and cycling to enhance the enjoyment of public spaces, reduce car trips and encourage only occasional car use via car-share schemes.

## Clean out those chemicals!

*If you've been wondering what to do with those left over chemicals and other nasties, the City of Canada Bay can help.*

A chemical clean out day will be held on Saturday, 15 October at Cintra Park car park, Crane Street, Concord from 9am-3.30pm. Only household quantities of chemicals can be accepted, with maximums of 20kg or 20 litres.

The Household Chemical Collection service was established by the Department of Environment and Heritage to help residents dispose of household chemicals safely.

Accepted chemicals include solvents and household cleaners, fluorescent light globes and tubes, batteries, motor oils, fuels and fluids, paint and paint products, pesticides and herbicides, poisons, gas bottles, fire extinguishers, pool chemicals, hobby chemicals and acids and alkalis.
