Recipients of the City of Canada Bay's Community Grants Program

Community Grants

The City of Canada Bay has awarded nearly \$60,000 worth of grants to local organisations and groups to be used for the benefit of the community.

Applications for funding were invited from not-for-profit community groups and organisations as part of Council's Community Grants Program.

Successful applicants were awarded a grant for services and projects that support the development of a City which is engaged, green, healthy, liveable, moving and vibrant.

This program is an integral part of Council's FuturesPlan20 – our 20 year vision for the City of Canada Bay that addresses areas that are important to both the community and Council. Recipients of these grants will use the money to help that vision come to fruition.

Grants totalling \$59,508 were awarded to 37 organisations in the City of Canada Bay. Recipients included All Hallows Parish School

who received \$3000 for a garden project that provides organic vegetables for children, families and the school; the Dobroyd branch of Sailability NSW who got \$3000 to go towards a new pontoon for use by the public, disabled sailors and the Dobroyd Aquatic Club; \$1000 was awarded to help Concord Community Food Inc host their annual seniors' picnic for older people across Canada Bay; and \$3000 was given to the Family Resource and Network Support (FRANS) to be used for programs that develop independence in people with a disability.

Carnival comes to town

Concord Carnival comes to town on Sunday, 17 October so get ready to celebrate!

Enjoy carnival fun from around the world with the beat of African drums, the elegance of Korean dance and the vibrancy of Spring – the season of new beginnings.

Relax in the spring sunshine while listening to local soprano, Donna Cain, who will calm the senses with a performance of popular arias while string quartet, Luscious Strings, excite with their repertoire of popular classical, opera, musical theatre and jazz music.

The Korean Carnival will be a celebration of tradition. This is the opportunity to see and hear four traditional Korean instruments; the KkwangGaRi, Jing, JangGo and Buk, which symbolise the sound of thunder, wind, rain and cloud movements. Traditional dancers will complement the music to give an authentic taste of Korea.

The African Carnival will celebrate the importance of drums within African culture, and introduce the community to drumming circles with a rousing performance and workshops to get involved in.

Immerse yourself in the atmosphere of the carnival and walk among roaming street performers, including drummers and stilt walking butterflies and spring flowers, pop in to the Canada Bay Museum, and take part in arts and crafts on offer to create your own Korean lantern.

Concord's fantastic array of cafés and restaurants will be serving up tasty treats, and stalls lining Majors Bay Road will provide browsing delights.

Concord Carnival is on Sunday, 17 October on Majors Bay Road, Concord, from 10am-4pm and is proudly brought to you by the City of Canada Bay and supported by the Canada Bay Club, The Nine Network, Cleanaway and the Inner West Courier.

Getting back to basics

The release of the annual 'Snapshot of NSW Councils' saw local government hit the media headlines, with concerns raised that many councils will need to cut services in future.

Metropolitan newspapers splashed stories detailing some of the financial predicaments facing many councils and the City of Canada Bay was listed as one of 10 councils experiencing some short term financial constraints. The Snapshot of NSW Councils is a regular publication released by the NSW Government with comparative data on all NSW councils.

In our case, Council's annual audits show us to be in a sound financial position. But that doesn't mean we are without challenge. The most significant financial issue facing the City is the gap between our current revenue and the significant amount needed to maintain the City's community infrastructure. Earlier this year Council deferred a proposed special rate increase to address this gap, and we are reviewing possible savings,

efficiency gains and revenue raising opportunities to enable us to spend more on infrastructure maintenance and renewal. If enough funds can't be raised, then Council may have no alternative but to seek a special rate increase or cut services. Neither alternative will be considered lightly and we will keep the community involved in making a decision about this important issue.

Small businesses win grant

Local businesses specialising in health are set to benefit from a grant of \$5000 from the State Government.

The NSW Minister for Small Business, Frank Terenzini, announced the grant on a recent visit to Canada Bay where he met with Mayor Angelo Tsirekas and Concord business owner and reflexologist, Sue Larkin.

Mr Terenzini explained that the grant was awarded to support local businesses that specialise in alternative health remedies. The grant will be used to help local business owners promote their services through seminars and to create an online resource to connect health practitioners in the area.

The funding is part of a state-wide program that will benefit more than 1500 small businesses in NSW by delivering \$470,000 in Government financial assistance this year.

Council is committed to supporting local business, and this grant will help us continue working towards our vision of a successful, sustainable city.

Canada Bay Connections

Canada Bay Connections, an exciting new project led by our local libraries, has made over 1500 historical and contemporary photos of Canada Bay available to view online.

Photos in the collection range from the 19th century to the present day, and have been digitised to ensure their preservation and to make them easily accessible to the community. The images capture a wide range of topics and ways of life, including heritage, the local environment, industrial history and sporting groups. There are also aerial photographs, subdivision plans from the early 20th century and the Drummoyne War Service Record, 1914-1918.

Canada Bay Connections show the link between the communities in the City, capturing a shared history and individual stories that will prove invaluable for students and researchers.

New youth project takes off

Council is investing in the future by engaging and involving young people from across Canada Bay.

Following the success of the regional Youth in Action Summit (YAS) held earlier this year, Council has launched a new initiative, a youth committee called Project Y. This committee will give young people the chance to work together and will assist with the development of Council's youth events and programs such as the 2011 Youth Week and Youth in Action Summit.

The committee will develop some of the ideas discussed at the 2010 YAS such as Operation Green Bottle – an initiative to work with schools to eliminate excessive use of disposable bottles; a publication for young people to share their stories and find local opportunities; and a 'place making' project which involves working with the local community to bring public spaces to life.

New bus service

Due to popular demand, an additional BayRider bus service began on Wednesday, 6 October.

Council's BayRider already helps residents with transport difficulties access local facilities and services, and this new Wednesday service will provide door-to-door transport to Concord Library, Concord Hospital, Rhodes Shopping Centre, Five Dock Shopping Centre and Burwood medical appointments.

Priority will be given to people who are not eligible to use other community transport services and a gold coin donation will be requested per trip.

This additional service, which will be trialled for the coming year, is the result of community consultation that identified a need for additional transport services for the area. The service will be coordinated by Drummoyne Community Centre and the existing BayRider will continue to provide a Thursday shuttle bus service around Canada Bay for residents with transport difficulties.

Chemical CleanOut in Canada Bay

Dispose of unwanted household chemical waste and reclaim space in your cupboards and sheds at the same time!

In association with the NSW Department of Environment and Climate Change, Council is again taking part in the state-wide *CleanOut* campaign on Saturday, 16 October from 9am-3.30pm at Cintra Park car park, Crane Street, Concord.

Now is the time to dig out long-forgotten chemical waste for safe and environmentally-friendly disposal, including paint, pesticides and herbicides, solvents, household cleaners, motor oils and fuels, batteries, gas bottles, fire extinguishers, pool chemicals and fluorescent tubes.

During the 2009 *CleanOut* day, 654 vehicles dropped off over 20,500 kilograms of waste, and with many people still storing old chemicals in their homes, Council expects a similar turnout this year.
