BIRD FRIENDLY BEACHES HAVE DOGS ON LEASHES



Threatened migratory shorebirds like the Bar-tailed Godwits feed in this area between August and May. Each year, they fly from the Arctic Circle where they breed, to feed on the mudflats of our local foreshore. Their ability to make the long flight back home relies on them feeding sufficiently during their time here.

What threats do migratory shorebirds face?

In the City of Canada Bay, the Bar-tailed Godwits depend on our local foreshore for survival. They no longer have undisturbed mudflats to feed on and their numbers are declining. They are sensitive to disturbance and fearful of dogs. If you own a dog, you can help protect these birds from the brink of extinction.

The problem is not dogs killing birds, it is dogs chasing or disturbing birds when they need to forage. Migratory shorebirds need to feed sufficiently to rebuild their strength for the 11,000km flight back to the Arctic summer. If they don't get enough food or rest, they are unlikely to survive their journey.

HOW CAN DOG OWNERS HELP PROTECT MIGRATORY SHOREBIRDS?



Obey leash laws – keep your dogs on a leash especially when walking along the foreshore and never allow your dog(s) to chase birds.

Go around large flocks of birds – whether they are feeding or resting, these birds need plenty of space. If birds run or fly away, you are too close.

Clean up after your dog – being a responsible pet owner by picking up your dog poo reduces the chance of harmful bacteria from impacting other dogs, wildlife and the water quality of Parramatta River.

Take the lead – practice the recommendations above and help educate other dog owners about how to share the foreshore with migratory shorebirds.
